MEET the CORNY STOLENIFEROUS

The Wiz Spiel welcomed a special team this year from the **Alberta Stewardship Network**. They went by the team name of the 'CORNY STOLENIFEROUS'. The botanical interpretation of this name is <u>Cornus sericea</u> (*C. stolonifera; Swida stolonifera;* Red Osier Dogwood). Northern North America. Many species in subgenus *Swida* are <u>stoloniferous</u> shrubs, growing along waterways. That explains the crown of woven dogwood branches that adorned these team members' heads.



This CORNY STOLEN team included Sarah Hipkin (Director of Communications and Education for the Land Stewardship Centre of Canada), Kevin Wirtanen (Operations Manager, Alberta Stewardship Network), Ernie Ewaschuk (Executive Director for the Land Stewardship Centre of Canada) and Ferna Ewaschuk (Ernie's personal support).

The **Alberta Stewardship Network** (ASN) was established in 2004 to support and celebrate the efforts of individual stewards and stewardship groups across Alberta. The Land Stewardship Centre of Canada was appointed Secretariat to administer the Alberta Stewardship Network.

This group has a mission 'to provide Alberta's stewards with a network that facilitates information exchange, provides support and recognizes the contribution of individuals, communities and organizations in advancing environmental stewardship on a watershed basis.' ASN is the WLWLSA's mentor and resource. We relied on their expertise and guidance to successfully set up our watershed stewardship association at Wizard Lake.

The ASN provided a grant of \$7500 to WLWLSA in 2008/09, a portion of which went toward the Wiz 'Spiel, our winter community building event. Wizard Lake Stewardship is very grateful for this funding. The Watershed Stewardship Grant Program supports stewardship groups with their on-the-ground (in this case, on-the-ice) activities and projects. This grant program is made possible by funding from the Alberta Government through Water for Life Strategy.

We look forward to having this fun ASN team return next year and look forward to another botany lesson.

FUTURE OF THE WIZARD LAKE AREA STRUCTURE PLAN

The County of Leduc is undertaking an Area Structure Plan for the Wizard Lake Area. The purpose of the plan is to identify a vision for the lake and its watershed. The plan involves developing an appropriate land use and planning policy framework to manage growth and guide development around the lake and within the watershed.

Residents, landowners, area associations and all stakeholders should be concerned and involved.

The Wizard Lake Watershed and Lake Stewardship Association has been invited to sit at the table with the County of Leduc and the consultant Office for Urbanism and its associates to give input in shaping this plan. This productive meeting took place on February 26, 2009. The intent of these meetings is to hear meaningful input and feedback related to development in this area, in order to establish a shared understanding of the issues. The public is invited to get involved in the decisions on the future of Wizard Lake. There are ample opportunities to do this. A public workshop is being held on May 2/09 in Calmar. EAGLES AT WIZARD LAKE

The other day I saw what looked like an eagle flying overhead and it reminded me of the pictures I had been given of sightings in the winter of 2007/2008. Yes, these pictures are at Wizard Lake. I had personally seen a pair in 2005 but not since until the other day. However, they are a part of our ecosystem so I thought I would share these pictures with you. Also, some eagle information (Alta Gov't).

An adult bald eagle, with its white head and tail, is easily identified, but a young or immature bird is often mistaken for a golden eagle. Adult plumage is not fully attained until the fifth or sixth year. The bald eagle has feathers extending only half-way down the leg, and less white showing at the base of the tail and primaries (longest wing feathers) than the golden eagle. Weight varies from 3 to 5.5 kg (7 to 12 lb.) and wingspan in an adult may reach up to 2.5 m (8 ft.). It is about 85 cm (33 in.) long.

This eagle is found only in North America, and in Alberta is most often seen in the mountain and northern regions. It winters in the central and southern U.S. and on the Pacific coast. Except during migration, the bald eagle is always found near rivers and lakes.

The bald eagle is a scavenger and a predator, subsisting mainly on fish. Small birds and rodents may also form part of its diet.



Nests are usually built near the tops of tall trees. Relatively small at first, the nest is added to and repaired each successive year it is inhabited, until it may reach a diameter of 2.5 m (8 ft.). Two to three white eggs are an average clutch size.


Now if any ornithologists amongst us can tell us if these pictures of something other than a bald eagle, please feel free to let us know – I am no expert. They are beautiful none the less.
